Medical and Graduate Student Preceptorship

The mission of the Rheumatology Research Foundation is to advance research and training that improves the health of people with rheumatic diseases.

The purpose of the preceptorship program is to introduce medical and graduate students to rheumatology by supporting a 4-Week or 8-Week, full-time clinical or research experience in the broad area of rheumatic disease.

Applicants have the option to select Clinical or Research when applying. The research preceptorship may include research seminar(s) attendance; rheumatology rounds; provisions for relevant coursework; or participation in research activities. The clinical preceptorships are not designed to replace a clinical clerkship in rheumatology. Programs should be designed as a "shadow" experience with the student <u>observing</u> the preceptor. The student should not be expected to perform independent patient management. Examples of such experiences may include observing patient contact in the clinical office, accompanying the preceptor on rehabilitation facility visits, hospital rounds and/or conferences at the preceptor's institution.

Several awards per year will be supported through the Majithia Family Endowment. This endowment aims to support one-on-one, real world rheumatology learning experiences among the best and brightest medical and graduate students.

Up to three awards annually will be supported by the Marc R. Chevrier, MD, PhD, FACR, Lupus Research Memorial Fund. This fund aims to support lupus research funded within the Foundation's preceptorships program.

Outstanding applications from health professionals may be supported through the Daniel J. Wallace, MD Graduate Student Preceptorship Endowment. This endowment aims to introduce graduate students to rheumatology-related health care by supporting a full-time clinical or research experience in the broad area of rheumatic disease.

Award Amount: \$4,000 for an at least 8-week research or clinical preceptorship to be completed within 12 months of award start date **or** \$2,000 for an at least 4-week clinical preceptorship to be completed within 12 months of award start date. \$1,000 for travel expenses (including air fare, hotel and meals) to attend the ACR Convergence.

All applications must be submitted by 5:00 PM ET on the deadline day through ProposalCentral at: <u>Proposal</u> Central.

Guidelines

All award recipients must abide by Foundation Awards and Grants Policies at all times.

Eligibility

- Preceptor must be an ACR or ARP member at the time of submission and for the duration of the award (students are not required to be members).
- A preceptor may be eligible to receive the award multiple times; however, they must work with a different student each time. Previous student/preceptor pairs are not eligible to apply again.
- Awarded students/preceptees are not eligible to apply twice.
- > Students enrolled in LCME or AOA COCA accredited medical schools, undergraduate students who have been accepted into medical school, students enrolled in an accredited graduate school, or undergraduate students who have been accepted into graduate school, are eligible to apply.
- > Students may apply during any year of their medical or graduate studies and must have identified a preceptor by the time of the application.
- > Preceptors who a familial relation with a proposed student are not eligible to serve as the student's preceptor.

Interested students can search the <u>ACR/ARP member directory</u> to find a rheumatologist or rheumatology health professional in their geographic area.

Review Criteria

Each application will be reviewed on the following criteria:

- 1. Project's relevance to rheumatic disease field
- 2. Preceptor's credentials as related to the project and previous experience(s) as a mentor/sponsor
- 3. Appropriateness and feasibility of student's role in the experience or project
- 4. The clinical or institutional environment, including experiences specifically designed for students

All awardees will be notified within 6 weeks of the application deadline, and all award payments will be made within 2 weeks receipt of required paperwork.

Award Terms and Funding

Students must complete at least eight-weeks/four-weeks of the preceptorship within 12 months from the award start date. The project must be completed within the proposed project dates. Students will receive a stipend <u>or</u> may waive the stipend and receive the preceptorship as a college elective credit. Preceptors will receive funding that may serve as a stipend or be used to cover related project expenses.

Students are also eligible to receive complimentary* registration to attend ACR Convergence. Students are eligible to attend ACR Convergence in the year that they were awarded the preceptorship, OR the following year to allow time for abstract submission. Students must notify the Foundation prior to attendance to receive these benefits. A \$1,000 stipend will be provided for travel expenses (including air fare hotel and meals) to attend the 2022 ACR Convergence.

ACR Convergence

The ACR Convergence meeting features the latest innovations, science, clinical and business best practices in rheumatology. Awardees will get first-hand access to the latest discoveries and research transforming rheumatic disease care, as well as the clinical applications that will improve the health of patients. It is an opportunity to experience personalized learning that allows awardees to expand your knowledge to new areas of interest and focus in rheumatology. *ACR membership is required to receive complimentary registration to attend the ACR Convergence. Membership is free to all student awardees.

Application Instructions

Before starting the online application, you will be required to create a Professional Profile in ProposalCentral, if you have not already. To do so, visit this link to begin creating your account.

All files must be saved as a PDF. Documents that do not have a required template should be formatted with ½ inch margin, 11-point Arial Font, and single-spacing (does not apply to figures and tables). All applications and documents must be written in English and avoid use of jargon. If terms are not universally know, spell out the term the first time it is used and note the appropriate abbreviation in parentheses. The acronym may be used thereafter.

Note: This application does not require official signature from an authorized institutional research office at the time of application. Institutional signature will be required if an award is received by the applicant.

You will be asked to confirm your eligibility and provide contact information in this section. In addition to the applicant information requested, you will be asked to upload the following documents:

You will be asked to identify your preceptor and provide contact information in this section.

Preceptor/Other Faculty Biosketch or CV

Limit to 5 pages.

Letter of Recommendation-Limit 1 page

A letter of recommendation is required from the preceptor describing the institutional environment (i.e., potential interactions with other trainees, other laboratories, etc.) and any proposed plans/experiences intended for the student during this preceptorship.

Required Documents

Project Proposal-Limit 3 pages

- Description of student's current and future interests.
- Goals and expectations to be achieved in the preceptorship.
- Description of preceptor's previous mentoring experience (past five years). Please include any awards or recognition received as well as any teaching activities.
- Description of experience intended for the student and address how they will be accomplished during the preceptorship.
 - For clinical experiences: include clinical seminar(s) attendance, rheumatology rounds, provisions for relevant coursework, or participation in limited clinical activities.
 - For research experiences: include research seminar(s) attendance; rheumatology rounds; provisions for relevant coursework; or participation in research activities.

➤ Provide a list of other faculty/investigators the student may encounter on a regular basis during this preceptorship. Please include names, explanation of their relationship and declaration of rheumatology related interests. Additional preceptors included in proposal must provide a written statement citing awareness of their responsibilities and support of the proposal. If applicable, this statement can be uploaded in the "Review Attachments/Additional Uploads" section of the application.
